What is the difference in meaning between these sentences?

In the first sentence, it could be any girl walking down any street.

In the second, it is a specific girl, and a specific street she is walking down.





The a and an are articles.

They are used with <u>nouns</u> to tell us if it is a <u>specific noun</u>, or a <u>general noun</u>. An is used instead of <u>a</u> if the next word begins with a vowel (a,e,i,o,u).

Example:

Give me a book.

Give me the book.

Demonstratives




Demonstratives tell us if the noun is near or far, and also if there is one or more.

Determiners: Articles & Demonstratives



Review:

Both <u>articles</u> and <u>demonstratives</u> <u>determine</u> which nouns we are talking about.

Use a/an if we are talking about a general or non specific noun. Use the if we are talking about a specific noun.

Use this for a single noun near us.

Use that for a single noun further away from us.

Use these for plural nouns near us.

Use those for plural nouns further away from us.
