

Direct and Reported Speech

Reported speech is exactly that! It is speech that has already happened, and so you are reporting it:

The man said that he was superman!

Direct speech is happening now. This is when you need to use punctuation.

The man said "I am superman!"





Direct and Reported Speech

Notice these changes:

The man said that he was superman!

'That' is removed, and the pronoun changes to show directly what was said.

Inverted commas are added around the actual words used. The exclamation mark goes BEFORE the closing inverted commas.

The man said I am superman!

Possible answers (note the highlighted parts)

Split speech:

"The girl will be better in the morning," the doctor said, "as long as she rests."

We need a comma (or !?) after the first part to show it will continue.

A comma or full stop to show that the speech is about to start again.

'No!' he cried. You can't leave now!'

Notice that there is no capital for 'he', even though it follows a exclamation mark.

This is correct!





"Wait for me here" she instructed him.





"Wait for me here" she instructed him.

Not correct - there should be a comma after 'here'





Politely she asked, "Can I have some food"?





Politely she asked, "Can I have some food"?

Not correct -? should come before the closing inverted commas.





"This is the best show ever!" he said proudly.





"This is the best show ever!" he said proudly.

All correct! 'he' should not have a capital.





"I am watching you very carefully," stated the detective, "every hour, every day."






