



These are the general rules for using apostrophes:

NEVER use for plurals.

## There are three cat's.

Use for contractions, when letters have been omitted (removed).

I've been thinking about cats.

The 'ha' is omitted from 'have'.

Use for possession, to show something belongs to nouns.

The cat's bed.

The bed belongs to the cat.

## The cat's bed. The cats' bed.

If the noun is plural, the apostrophe goes after the s. This is because the plural of cat is cats, so it already has an s because of that.









Which of these sentences is correct?



- A. The Halloween decorations are decaying, especially the pumpkins teeth. Cedric carved all ten jack-o-lanterns, and he can't bear to throw them away.

- C. The Halloween decorations are decaying, especially the pumpkin's teeth. Cedric carved all ten jack-o-lanterns, and he can't bear to throw them away.





B. The Halloween decorations are decaying, especially the pumpkins' teeth. Cedric carved all ten jack-o-lanterns, and he can't bear to throw them away.

Sentence B is correct. The context of the sentence (all ten jack-o-lanterns) makes clear the fact that more than one pumpkin is rotting away.







A: The dog's hair was pulled out by the cat.

B: The cat pulled all the dogs hair out.

C: The dogs' hair was pulled out by the cats.

Answer





A: The dog's hair was pulled out by the cat.

B: The cat pulled all the dogs hair out.

C: The dogs' hair was pulled out by the cats.

It could be A or C depending on if there is one or more dogs. B is definitely wrong as their is no apostophe indicating that the hair belongs to the dog or dogs.





A: There were lots of toy's in the garden.

B: In the garden, there were toy's everywhere.

C: Toys here, toys there, the garden was a mess.

Answer





A: There were lots of toy's in the garden.

B: In the garden, there were toy's everywhere.

C: Toys here, toys there, the garden was a mess.

Only C is correct. An apostrophe should not be used for a plural. This is a common mistake.





A: The man's hat.

B: The ladies' books.

C: The women's shoes.

Answer





A: The man's hat.

B: The ladies' books.

C: The women's shoes.

## All of these are correct:

A: The hat of the man -- singular, so add 's

B: The books of the ladies -- plural ending in s, so add an apostrophe

C: The shoes of the women -- plural not ending in s, so add 's
