

What is a phrase?

- -A group of words
- -Does not have a subject and verb working together

eg: a light brown jacket (noun phrase) might be having (verb phrase)

Prep with my friends (prepositional phrase)

What is a clause?

- Group of words with subject and verb

S Verbeg: Birds learn to fly when they are young.



A clause: Group of words with subject and verb

What is the difference between main and subordinate clauses?

Main clause:

Can make sense on its own (Also known as independent clause)

Subordinate clause:
Does not make sense on its own
(Also known as dependent)

While I was walking, I noticed the school was closed.
