

What is a verb?

A word which shows action or the state of something.

What is an adverb?

A word that gives more detail to a verb.\*

\*More about this later!

So far you have seen 'action' verbs.

Verbs can also show the state of how something is, and be used to control tense.

Some common verbs like this are...

T	I had
I am I was I have	_ 1100
	e You had
He/She/It/Name is He was He has	He had
We are We were We are	We had
You are You were You are	You had
They are They were They ar	e They had

## ADVERBS

Remember we said adverbs give more detail about a verb?

There is ALOT more that they do.

They can also modify (change) adjectives and other adverbs...





Adverbs modifying verbs...

Carefully describes the way she was driving.

Example:

The dog was too hungry to wait.

adjective = hungry adverb = too

Adverbs modifying adjectives...

Adverbs modifying adverbs...

Example:

The second car went more quickly.

adverb = more describes adverb = quickly

Which is the adverb here?

The baby cried very loudly.





Adverbs modifying adverbs...

Example:

The second car went more quickly.

adverb = more describes adverb = quickly

Which is the adverb here?

The baby cried very loudly.







Often we think adverbs end in -ly...
This is often true, but not always:

The cowardly lion

'cowardly' is an adjective

He works hard

'hard' is the adverb







Just remember this...

Adverbs tell you how, when, where, or why something happened.

Adjectives tell you what kind, which, or how many.

Also...

Many -ly words are adverbs!
