

Phrases

Can you remember what a phrase is?

- A phrase is a group of words.
- They do not make sense on their own.
- They are not a complete sentence

Preposition

Can you remember what a **preposition** is?

They tell us more where the noun is happening.

Prepositional Phrases



The man **in the red suit** ran away.

The part in blue is the phrase.

It is prepositional, because it starts with a preposition (in).

They tell us more about **where, when or how** something is happening.

This is an example of a **how** phrase.

Prepositional Phrases

- 1) Which part is the phrase?
- 2) Is it a **where**, **when** or **how** phrase?

The boy when eating his dinner was sick.

The monster with great strength opened the gate.

The train scurried down the tracks.

Prepositional Phrases

Could you start a sentence with the phrases?

The boy **when eating his dinner** was sick.

The monster **with great strength** opened the gate.

The train scurried **down the tracks**.

What impact does this have on the sentence?

The importance changes.

Phrases

The titanic **when it was damaged** sank in the sea.

This is a '**when**' phrase.

Can you change it to a '**how**' and '**where**' phrase?
